Every aspect of EchoX—from our online resources to our paid programming for youth—has been constructed out of our co-founders' passionate vision to support our region's ethnic cultural communities and our dedicated staff's desire to create a space that they lacked as youth (and now as young adults). Over the years, reactions from BIPOC and immigrant community members have supported this vision. We've had community members tear up and even start to cry. One high school classroom gave us a standing ovation. In talks with adults, we have heard sighs of relief: "Finally, I see myself here."

It is not surprising, then—with the overwhelming support of community members, young and old—that we have had tech industry experts and university professors eager to volunteer their services and expertise (over 13,000 volunteer hours since 2020) because of what is at stake: digital equity and representation.

"Along with the strong impact of social media and other online platforms, teens (especially BIPOC teens), place a high value on peer relationships at a time when peers "other" them and spread stereotypical disinformation about their familial cultural backgrounds, foods, and art. As a biracial mother of multi-racial, multi-cultural children, I saw this first-hand. The trauma youth of color experience in high school has an impact on their future emotional and economic health. Where is the outlet? School is not always a comfortable place to express one's identity. And yet these teens are naturally internet savvy, they are creative, they need peer support, and they can teach us to think in new ways. So, we meet them where they already are—online. We provide an online platform to support their ethnic cultural identities while introducing them to best practices in digital literacy within a supportive peer-to-peer environment."

"Growing up, I loved writing and sharing stories, but I didn't have a lot of access to media that featured mixed-race, mixed-culture stories. In high school, I had to watch our theatre director utilize red and yellow face on my classmates to play Chinese and Native characters in the school musicals. When I tried to write about it at the school newspaper, she accused me of libel and other students pretended 'Indian' at me. Through *Voices* and *DIGITIZE*, I have been given the opportunity to finally create the Story Gathering series, a program that I had always dreamed of, an outlet for teens and other young adults to write and publish their own stories about themselves and their ethnic cultural backgrounds in a space where they can feel supported and encouraged."

"When I was growing up I didn't have a place outside of my home where I could explore my culture. I was the only person at my school who was Native American until my sister

joined me in high school. I found myself having very few resources to learn about and practice my culture in community. The few things that my teachers pointed me towards were history books written by White authors and so I often felt that there was no place for my culture to be a part of my education. It didn't feel safe or even remotely true to who I am or the generations that came before me. EchoX is a place where youth can dive deep into their culture. It's one of the few places I've found to be authentic and generative. I didn't have that growing up, but youth today can thanks to EchoX."

## **DIGITIZE Youth Council (2019–20, 2020–21)**

The *DIGITIZE* Youth Council was a program we held during the 2019–20, 2020–21 school years. We had plans to continue this program but ultimately retired it due to difficulties with the pandemic and the students' extended 'online time' with virtual classes.

"Working with Sierra and EchoX helped me find ways to talk about my other side (Indonesian). It was something I hadn't explored before; I usually had focused on my Black side. It was refreshing to think and talk about my entire identity."
